

6 WAYS TO WORK FOR SOCIAL JUSTICE IN 10 MINUTES A DAY



1) Go to [commoncause.org](https://www.commoncause.org) to find contact info, email addresses, social media handles, etc. for your state and federal representatives and senators. This is foundational to the other resources offered here. Once you have your politicians' contact info, [come back to PTM!](#)

2) Sign up for action alerts through the [Episcopal Church's Office of Government Relations](#). You can sign up to receive periodic email blasts when federal bills are up for voting, etc. This may not seem like much action, but if you weren't doing this before now, you've increased your communication with elected officials by 100%! Politicians need to hear from their constituents and keep track of positive and negative support for various pending legislation.

Start following your elected officials and respond when they solicit opinions, or just offer yours. They value social media as an important way to stay in touch with their voters.
